THE KANSAS GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 8, 2022

THE NOVEMBER 08 ELECTION IS A BIG ONE!

There will be lots of state and local races on the ballot, including for Governor, and we'll decide whether or not to retain Kansas Supreme Court judges.

THERE WILL ALSO BE TWO CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS ON YOUR BALLOT. If passed, these amendments would:

- increase the power of the Kansas Legislature by allowing them to overturn
- any executive agency decision with just a majority vote
- 2. mandate the election of county sheriffs and move the authority to initiate the recall of sheriffs from local District Attorneys to the state Attorney General

AS A KANSAS VOTER...

There's a lot on the line this year. Here's how you can cast your vote in Kansas.

1. Make *sure* you're registered to vote.

Check your existing registration, re-register if you've moved recently, or register to vote for the first time! Do it online **before the October 18 deadline** at: **KSVotes.org.**

2. Get ready to vote early.

It's free, easy, and safe to vote by mail in Kansas! Fill out an online request for an advance ballot at **KSVotes.org.**

3. Be an informed voter.

Go to **KSBallot.org** to learn more about what issues are on your ballot, the candidates, and the proposed constitutional amendment.

4. VOTE!
